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that isn't my grammar but that is the best that I can determine from the record of how that motion read and how that Committee was constituted. Now all I am asking here is that we create an official record in that the actions that we take on Thursday, or any other time subsequent, be based upon the record of everything that's transpired up to that point. I am not involving myself in a great reproduction problem. I am asking that somewhere there exist an official record of the proceedings that have existed so far and under the charge to the Committee that all the books, documents, papers, material and other information which they acquired in the process of their proceedings be gathered together in order that in the future, first of all in our deliberation, we have access to peruse that if we wish. Now if Senator Marsh cares to vote on the issue without looking at the record of the proceedings, that is her individual judgment and her individual position. There may be other Senators in here who feel differently about that and feel that they would care to vote on the record of the proceedings and they are entitled to have, to have access to that. My motion is directed at constructing all of the materials which we charged that Committee to acquire in order to produce a report to this body. That all those be assimilated in a meaningful manner, indexed, marked as exhibits, in order that when the issue is presented for this body's deliberation as was the intent of the original motion that that Committee present us with the issue, that we are able to refer to it in our discussions and deliberations in an orderly and processed manner. Now, if we are going to refrain from **creating** that report until the time that the debate occurs on this floor, there is no way that we can do that. So if the Committee wishes that we not be able to delve into its transactions, that appears to be the position of Senator Warner now. I think that that's a wrong position. I think that this body, or the members who wish to, shall have access to everything and that it be set out in a meaningful, working manner. So I'll oppose the motion.

SENATOR MARVEL: I would like to respond to the motion that's been presented, Mr. President.

SPEAKER: The Warner motion.

SENATOR MARVEL: Yes sir.

SPEAKER: You may proceed.

SENATOR MARVEL: I support the Warner motion for the following reasons, that the Committee is doing exactly what Senator Cavanaugh is asking for and that is to present in an orderly manner to this body for debate on Thursday the information that the Committee has processed to come to its decision. This information will be presented to you in an orderly manner. The decision will be discussed. There's an honest difference of opinion in the decision but I think that Senator Cavanaugh will get all the information that the Committee has processed, and that's exactly, as far as I'm concerned, what we are charged with and that's exactly what I understand him to say. Therefore, I support Senator Warner's motion and it was my understanding yesterday that this decision was decided and that we would proceed to gather this information and give it to the Legislature as requested so that we could debate on Thursday. Now, if we are not going to do that, let's debate now. So I support the motion because what Senator Cavanaugh wants will be given to him, everything that the Committee has processed in arriving at its decision. If the Legislature disagrees with this decision, it can charge the Committee to go back and pursue the matter further on Thursday. That was our original agreement
