CLERK: None, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Motions to advance bills from committee.

CLERK: None.

PRESIDENT: Other pending motions.

CLERK: Senator Stull has a motion pending. Mr. President, a request by Senator Stull. A motion to withdraw LB 229. It was left pending from last Thursday. I'm sorry, what's the bill.

SENATOR STULL: 191 isn't it Vince.

CLERK: What's the bill number? It's not 229. Legislative Bill 191, Mr. President.

SENATOR STULL: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I would like to withdraw this bill. I think I've reached an agreement with people involved and probably we've accomplished our purpose without going through with passing of the bill.

PRESIDENT: The question is, shall LB 191 be withdrawn. Is there any further discussion or debate? The Clerk is checking whether it takes 25 votes or majority of those present. I think we can go ahead and record our vote. Would you record your vote. Have you voted? Record the vote.

CLERK: 31 ayes, 1 nay, 17 not voting.

PRESIDENT: LB 191 is withdrawn. Anyother pending motions Mr. Clerk?

CLERK: No further, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Unfinished business including messages on President's desk.

CLERK: I have none.

PRESIDENT: And I have none. Consideration of bills on General File.

CLERK: Legislative Bill 92, introduced by Senator Kennedy of the 21st District. (Bill read). The bill was first considered, Mr. President, on January 23rd and laid over. There are amendments by Senator Kennedy's Public Health and Welfare Committee.

PRESIDENT: Chair recognizes Senator Kennedy.

SENATOR KENNEDY: Mr. President and fellow members, I'd like to explain LB 92. It was heard in public hearing. We had no objections to it. We had support from Mr. Rex Higley representing the Licensor Board under the Health Department; Mr. Ken Neff representing Nebraska Medical Association; and Mr. Lawrence Murphy, counsel for the Chiropractors of the State of Nebraska. They all supported
