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say to you there may be two or three amendments on Select File that we may have to address. We've got that working now. But I'm saying the choice is yours now. Here is a legal, constitutional way to put the money out that we appropriated. Now there will be those that claim that this is not the solution, and the end all solution, and the total solution. I've been looking for that total solution for 5 months. I've seen no definitive action, I've seen no positive action, I've seen no one moving forward to say let's grab the problem and let's move with it. Well here is a legal and constitutional way to solve the problems. To do what I know you wanted to do last year when, without a descending vote, this body passed LB 403. We have a commitment to those children. We have a commitment to those providing services. We need to get the money moving. There are a series of other bills that will be forth coming. There will be a repeal of the present appropriation bill and ascertainment of a new appropriation bill, and that's coming. But I have 14 days beyond the time of the initiation of the act, to get the A bill there. There will be a bill forthcoming and that doesn't even have to come very soon to say that how the state recoups their money in case they overpay. That bill will say that you can recoup it on the fourth payment of 403 money, or you may recoup it at another source that the state gives the local school district, namely state aid to education and apportionment funds. I believe this is a solid proposal for an emergency situation. This is going to be one of the shortest bills on the record books of the State of Nebraska because it expires 4 weeks past the time that it's introduced. It's emergency legislation, it goes in and out. Its sole purpose is to get out what should have been paid last quarter, and has not been paid. Now if you want that money out there here is a legal way to do it. We also have, if and I'm requesting if this bill be introduced . . . and Mr. Speaker I'm requesting that it be placed on General File at the top. I would hope that we can even pass that on today, if there's not substantial debate about it. Mr. Chairman, with those remarks I move for the introduction of Request 782.

SPEAKER: Chair recognizes Senator Rumery.

SENATOR RUMERY: Mr. Chairman and members of the Legislature, I rise to support our chairmans request on this bill. I don't know whether you members realize or not that this Legislature made a solemn promise to members of boards of education and superintendents throughout this state, when the Legislature said in affect it is your obligation now to educate all people within your district. It also said in affect we are going to support you in this effort by supplying 90 percent of the cost of this education. I was appalled to learn in these hearings that superintendents and boards of education had gone ahead in good faith, had hired special staff people to teach this type of educational process. They met all of the requirements that apparently were laid down to them. They were certified as being eligible
