PRESIDENT: We will be at ease to receive a visitor. Mr. Sergeant at Arms. The Speaker asked me to announce that Senator Goodrich will escort to the Chambers, Governor Jimmy Carter of the state of Georgia. It gives me the pleasure, I have had the privilege of meeting Governor Carter and he is one of the outstanding nuclear engineers in the south-east has a great record in agriculture and business and was an outstanding Governor from Georgia from 1970-74. Former Governor, Jimmy Carter from the state of Georgia.

JIMMY CARTER: First of all I would like to express my deep appreciation to you members of the Unicameral Legislature of Nebraska for giving me this great honor. I recognize that your work is very important. I don't intend to impose on your time except for a few brief moments. It is very good to come here and make a report to you from the south-east and perhaps from around the country about some of the needs of our nation and I'll be very brief. I appreciate the introduction, and I think our nation is one that is highly diverse in nature. It is no more diverse than individual members of our own electorate and our own citizenry. Sometimes an introduction can be very disconserving but the one today was very good. When I was running for the Governorship of Georgia about 5 years ago, I went to Western College, a small girls school in fact it is the oldest girls college in the whole nation. I sponed on our Governors honor program. We have them, each summer the 400 brightest highschool students in the state. This is determined by competitive examinations. We give them an eight week intensive training course of an advanced nature to stretch these brilliant young minds and also to learn new teaching techniques. They take back to their own individual highschools the experiences that we learn at Western. One day out of each eight week course is set aside for career training and we bring on the college campus people that represent different careers, registered nurses, school teachers, doctors, lawyers, farmers, business men and other professionals. Students in small groups meet with these people to learn how to plan their life career in a very orderly fashion. So when they get to college they won't waste their time switching from one course of study to another. I was invited to come in and make a main evening banquet address and the young man who introduced me had done a great deal of research on my background. He got up and told the students how proud they were to have, at that time, Senator Jimmy Carter come and tell them how to plan their lifes career in an orderly fashion. He pointed out I was born and raised in a little town of Plains, Georgia, with a population of 600. That I had graduated from high school there. Then he said, Senator Carter went to Georgia Southwestern College where he studied chemistry. Then he said, he went to Georgia Tech where he studied engineering. Then he pointed out that I went to the U.S. Naval Academy where I got a degree in
