PRESIDENT: At the request of the Speaker, Senator Dworak, would you pass 200 and go to 156 because there are specific amendments to 200 and the Speaker would like to move off Select File.

SENATOR DWORAK: Mr. President, I move the adoption of the Enrollment and Review amendments to LB 156.

PRESIDENT: Any discussion of the motion? All in favor say aye. Contrary say nay. The amendments are adopted.

SENATOR DWORAK: Mr. President, I move that LB 156 be advanced to Enrollment and Review for engrossment.

PRESIDENT: Any discussion of the motion? The question is shall LB 156, as amended, be advanced. All in favor say aye. Contrary say nay. The bill, as amended, is so advanced.

Senator Burbach.

SENATOR BURBACH: Mr. President, being there are several amendments to LB 200, because in our calendar we have set aside the time of 10:45 to go onto General File, so I recommend that we do go on General File at this time, and discuss LB 15. We have with us today many students from several different schools who want to watch and observe the Legislature in action on legislation that they are very vitally interested in. Whether this bill is passed, or whether it is turned down, this is still educational for the youngsters, either to win or to lose on the discussion on General File of LB 15.

PRESIDENT: We are now on General File. Mr. Clerk, we'll take up LB 15.

CLERK. Read title.

PRESIDENT: Senator Savage.

SENATOR SAVAGE: Mr. President, and members of the Legislature, as I explained to the committee, at the committee hearing, this is not a frivolous jesture on my part . . .

PRESIDENT: Could we have some order in the chamber. As the Speaker just announced we are also in the process of an abject lesson in government in action.
