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that even two or three hundred dollars is a big amount to us.

PRESIDENT: Senator Koch.

SENATOR KOCH: Mr. Speaker, members of the body, Senator Duis, here, had a few questions he wanted to ask and I would be happy to answer them for him. He asks, Senator Duis, who this survey was directed to. It was directed to the mayors of 40 cities in the state of Nebraska, and in some cases possibly they didn't understand but the question was, what are your present publishing cost under the statutes of Nebraska and the second question was, what would be your publishing cost if 193 were enacted and these were the figures that were presented to us in the returns from those cities. Now whether the mayor answered, the clerk answered or the city manager answered it, I can't answer that but that is who the survey was directed to.

SENATOR DUIS: Well, Senator Koch, the thing that bothers me considerably here is this good city of Scottsbluff, out here, it is going to cost them...what is it, \$5,000. Grand Island, it is going to cost them \$8,000 more. Then I look down here at Papillion and they are going to spend \$850 less than they did before. And here is LaVista is going to spend...I don't know. I can't help but wonder where they got the figures.

SENATOR KOCH: I will agree that there is a possibility that you can't understand them. Some of them I can't either but I can on Fremont, Wayne, Scottsbluff and others who sent...and I will repeat again, Scottsbluff and others if you want me to, but their present publishing costs, this includes legals and all those type of things, \$20,885 and the anticipated costs under 193 will be \$25,885 cost.

SENATOR DUIS: You just said the magic word, anticipated...

SENATOR KOCH: ...costs.

SENATOR DUIS: ...anticipated...anticipated costs.

SENATOR KOCH: Right.

SENATOR DUIS: Now, I can anticipate most anything.

SENATOR KOCH: Except I think there is one thing, Senator Lewis quoted three small villages. Now we are talking about cities that have a large number of employees and a great amount of purchasing power and I can see significant additional costs for cities such as Grand Island, Wayne, Fremont, Columbus, Scottsbluff, Alliance and others where they have large numbers of people who are employed by them.

PRESIDENT: Senator Burrows.

SENATOR BURROWS: Mr. Chairman, as a member of the Urban Affairs Committee, I would like to speak on behalf of the bill as it came out of Committee. I would like to bring attention to these figures on our sheets on our desks, the number of these figures that came out with three zeros on the end of the even thousand dollars. I do not feel
