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presents and I am against raising the bill, by the way. But he puts it to us as a highway safety bill and it doesn't have anything to do with highway safety. In the accident report that he supplied us, the negligent party was the party that drove to the left of center around a parked vehicle. Now a parked vehicle could have been there for any reason and the obligation to be safe is on the person who approaches the parked vehicle from the rear and if you are going to pass one, regardless of the circumstances, that is the person who has the obligation to proceed cautiously and I don't think we understand at all how this effects hunters or doesn't effect hunters. What you have got to...if you want to accomplish what Senator Warner wants to accomplish, you can't park or stop for any reason on any roadway or if you do, you are negligent or it will involve you in the negligent process. But the law now is that if you want to pass a vehicle no matter what the circumstances and move across the center of the road, you do that in a cautious manner and if you don't do it in a cautious manner and you run into somebody coming through the right-of-way, you, the passing party, are the negligent party and not the obstruction that you had an opportunity to observe and avoid or to pass around in a cautious manner. He has no responsibility. You are the one driving and in this case, the negligent party was the person who drove to the left of center and struck him. He would be whether Senator Warner's bill was enacted or not and no matter what the reason that car was parked on the road. So I don't think this has anything to do with hunting and it certainly wouldn't help the highway safety situation because it doesn't place any obligation on that parked vehicle. I don't think there is any reason to have the bill and it shouldn't be raised.

SPEAKER BURBACH PRESIDING.

SPEAKER: The chair recognizes Senator Carsten.

SENATOR CARSTEN: Mr. President and members of the Legislature, I rise in support of the motion to raise the bill from Committee. I voted to not kill the bill in Committee. I think that I should say this that I supported 799 last year realizing full well that Iowa had this bill for many years. Apparently with success and I had felt that if this would help our farmer-hunter relationship that it was worthy of a try. We have had it in operation for a year now and as far as Senator Syas saying our problems are made by the coyote hunters. In my district, in my area, up until we passed this bill, we didn't have any problems but we certainly have this year and I don't believe that even after one year's trial that it is working successfully in Nebraska and I am concerned that before very long, the hunter is not going to find a place to hunt. Your hunter-farmer relationship is decreasing rapidly and this bill has certainly contributed to it. I hope that you will support Senator Warner in his move to raise this bill.

SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes Senator Dickinson.

SENATOR DICKINSON: I rise to support Senator Warner's efforts to raise the bill with the understanding that I will offer an amendment, if it is raised and if it ever gets to the top of General File, that it would provide that hunting
