SENATOR KENNEDY: If there are no objections.

PRESIDENT: No, he is moving that it be bracketed. Senator Lewis, for what purpose do you rise.

SENATOR LEWIS: I want to place a temporary objection and make a couple of comments.

PRESIDENT: No, this morning the Chair said that we were not going to argue these things. If you...and that is the ruling. If you challenge I'll withdraw my ruling and you can speak. Do you challenge my ruling that there is no argument on a motion to bracket. If you want to that is fine, and I'll withdraw my ruling.

SENATOR LEWIS: I just want to make one point.

PRESIDENT: I'll withdraw my ruling.

SENATOR LEWIS: These are special bills that we have brought up from way down at the bottom. The committee was trying to resolve a problem that existed in the community. I have no particular interest in the bill. I did not try to sub-difuse any kind of thing within the bill. Maybe I didn't have enough legal training and there might be a problem with that particular amendment. The intention isn't to make the Norfolk Community Schools...

PRESIDENT: Question is bracketing the bill not the substance of the bill.

SENATOR LEWIS: Alright, I would ask that we not bracket it and I would ask that we move it across so that we have not wasted this entire debate and that bill is a hundred down again, so I would ask that we add the amendments on Select File and I would help do so. Under these provisions I would oppose the bracketing and ask that the bill be advanced to Select File.

PRESIDENT: Senator Dickinson.

SENATOR DICKINSON: I'm a little confused about the issue now.

PRESIDENT: The question is shall the bill be bracketed I attempted to stop debate and failed.

SENATOR DICKINSON: Yes, lets bracket it.

PRESIDENT: Senator Cavanaugh. There is indifference to Senator Dickinson who jumped back to quick. Senator Dickinson.

SENATOR DICKINSON: Thank you sir. Could I ask a question of the Chair.

PRESIDENT: Yes sir.
