I understand it correctly.

PRESIDENT: But you included your specific amendment.

SENATOR DUIS: That is correct, sir. Yes sir. I have included it.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. The question is, shall the bill be returned for specific amendment by Senator Duis. Record your vote. Have you voted? Record.

CLERK: 27 ayes, 18 nays on the motion to return, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: The bill is returned. Senator Duis.

SENATOR DUIS: Mr. President, I move that the amendment be adopted.

PRESIDENT: Oh, excuse me. I am sorry. The bill is on Select File.

CLERK: There is a motion on 198A, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: All right. Read the motion.

CLERK: I move to bracket 198A on Final Reading. Signed Senator Duis.

SENATOR DUIS: I believe, s'r, this would be the proper procedure to wait the outcome of 198 and then we can take it up.

PRESIDENT: The question is, shall 198...Senator DeCamp.

SENATOR DeCAMP: It is not on Final Reading, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: I understand the procedure is that the A bill follows so it would go right along. So perhaps the vote is not necessary. We move to 306 on Final Reading. Mr. Clerk, would you please read that bill for the Final time.

CLERK: Engrossed legislative bill 306. Read.

(RECORDER TURNED OFF FOR FINAL READING)

CLERK: I move to return LB 317 to Select File for a specific amendment to strike the enacting clause. Signed Senator DeCamp.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator DeCamp.

SENATOR DeCAMP: Mr. President and members of the Legislature, I don't think the full implications of LB 317 have been presented. I believe from reading the bill and I believe that anybody that wants to take the time here while we are talking to read it can reasonably deduce that the bill, as it is written, would give more power, authority and such things to the State Office of Planning and Programming than has ever been given any state agency in the history of the state. More authority, in many respects, than the Governor or this Legislature has and for that reason, I
