PRESIDENT: LB 198.

CLERK: Mr. President, LB 198 is just...

SENATOR DWORAK: Mr. President, I move the advancement of LB 198 to E & R for engrossment.

CLERK: Mr. President, there is a motion to amend LB 198 as follows; to delete \$110 and insert \$96.

PRESIDENT: Is that Senator Duis' amendment? Senator Duis. Would a Page or a Sergeant at Arms please find Senator Duis? We are back on 198 that was discussed in Final Reading. It is now up on Select File. It looks like we are going to go under Call here. The Chair requests that any Senators that hear their microphones on return to the Chamber so that we can get on with this matter. Could we hold it up just a minute or two until some Senators...I think all of you would be interested in knowing that last night in Omaha, Mrs. Marie Savage was awarded the School Bell award by the Omaha Education Association for her long-standing and valuable contributions to education. Senator Savage is not in the Chamber but we do commend both Senator and Mrs. Savage for that outstanding award. The Chair recognizes Senator Duis.

SENATOR DUIS: Mr. President, I move that the amendment be adopted. Then, Mr. President, I don't believe that I need to go into any more explanation, and if there is anything that is necessary, I would do it on closing because I don't want to belabor the issue.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. It is true that this matter has been heavily debated. The Chair recognizes Senator Cavanaugh.

SENATOR CAVANAUGH: I'd request that it would be laid over.

PRESIDENT: Is that a motion?

SENATOR CAVANAUGH: I'd ask for unanimous consent.

PRESIDENT: No. There is an objection.

SENATOR CAVANAUGH: I make a motion.

PRESIDENT: All right. There is a motion to lay over the specific amendment. Any discussion. Record your vote. You're voting on laying over the Duis amendment to LB 198. Have you voted? We have spent a great deal of time on this matter. Would you kindly vote, Senators? Have you voted? Record, Mr. Clerk. Senator Cavanaugh.

SENATOR CAVANAUGH: I ask for a Call of the House.

PRESIDENT: The question is, shall the House go under Call? Record your vote. Record.

CLERK: 22 ayes, 7 nays to go under Call.

PRESIDENT: The House is under Call. Please take your chairs again and would the Sergeant at Arms secure the presence of all Senators? Please take your chairs so that the Clerk..and
