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be effective in other states. Only about 10% of the people actually take part in these elections and I wonder, too, how would we establish who is a soybean producer. Is it somebody that is raising soybeans at the present time? If I had soybeans two years ago and haven't been raising soybeans for two years now, will I qualify to vote, even if I haven't raised soybeans for two years but will next year and another point I would like to bring out is that it states, fifty soybean growers who receive a substantial portion of their income within given district. What does that mean? And I think it would also violate the one man, one vote requirement by using these territories established in the bill. This is not according to population. This is according to the number of growers, soybean growers in that area. So I think this amendment would be unconstitutional, as far as the one man, one vote concept. And also, it doesn't provide for where the elected Board shall meet, who will pay for the rented space, if this is necessary? Under my bill, the meeting will be held in the Department of Agriculture and there is no provision for removing a member of the Board, if he does not qualify for different reasons, not raising soybeans, not living in the district, or not attending meetings. I had my bill, as amended, reviewed by the Attorney General's assistant and he states that he can't see anything wrong with the bill. So I hope we reject the proposed amendments and adopt my bill as is and advance it from Select File. Thank you.

PRESIDENT: Senator Clark. Senator Clark.

SENATOR CLARK: Mr. President, members, I have never supported LB 74. The reason I haven't is because you don't have the election. Now, if you don't believe in the election process, maybe the Governor ought to appoint all of us. I think the election process, and I see Governor Whelan thinks it is a good idea. Maybe he would get better cooperation. But, really, if you don't have the election process, I don't think you have anything. In fact I'd go for the referendum also but I will support the bill if it has the election process. Without it, I won't.

PRESIDENT: Senator Murphy.

SENATOR MURPHY: A question of Senator Maresh. Senator, how would your two candidates that the Governor is to pick between be chosen, if not by an election.

SENATOR MARESH: Well, the soybean...according to my bill and as approved by the Ag Committee, the Soybean Association makes nominations for him to select from, these would have to be soybean growers.

SENATOR MURPHY: This same process would not suffice to elect one instead of two.

SENATOR MARESH: Well, it is up to two. At least two, I should say, because they could nominate five if they wish to. The bill provides for at least two to be nominated from each of the district and then he appoints one at large. There is seven members.
