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argued longer and louder for aid for the medical school and for the college of dentistry than I have. It reminds me of the story of Abraham Lincoln and the story of he and his friend were eating ginger bread men. The friend, there were five ginger bread men and Abe only got one. He said to his friend "You must like ginger bread" and the friend said "I don't know of anyone who likes more and gets less". I think that is the way it stands in out-state Nebraska. There is no one that wants medical help in out-state Nebraska more than I do and gets less until I raise hell and put a block under it and we finally got some in David City, Nebraska. There are a lot of communities in out-state Nebraska that are just not getting the kind of help that we envision that we should have. Senator Mills, is very eloquent and he is also going to be doctorless in rural Nebraska until something is done that can bring these people to the out-state areas. Now the argument for the bill I believe argues for the bracketing. We have been told that unless these people take their residencies in Nebraska that they don't stay here. I agree with that heartily. I have said it many times on the floor, but the facts are also true that once they take their residencies in the Metropolitan areas that is where they stay. They then decide that they prefer to become specialists and that they prefer that they do not go to out-state Nebraska. It is only when they get out into the Country that they find out that there not operating off of some ironing board out there in somebody's back shed. We do have the ability and the facilities to train doctors. Now someone told me the other day that it is impossible to train them in all of the many specialized areas of need. The facts are that they do not need to be trained and in specialized fields because most of the type of work that has to be done in specialized areas is going to be performed in Lincoln and Omaha anyway. So what we need in out-state Nebraska are people who are trained in the needs of those persons who reside in those areas. They have to be trained to recognize the needs of people and if there is an emergency that occurs, or a case for a specialist comes up, were going to ship them to Omaha or Lincoln anyway. But we need to have training in General Practice in out-state Nebraska. Now I know that there are people here who are arguing loud and long for the extra money. That is fine with me and I'll support it. But I want to point out that when we have the very best man in family practice to probably walk the face of the earth, at least the face of the United States, some of these same people were reluctant to appropriate the money that was necessary to keep him here. We lost Dr. Land and we lost Dr. Koogle, a darn good Dean and a man under whom the medical school made great progress. WE lost those people. A few years ago on this floor I tacked some \$80,000 on a budget committee bill to provide for additional training for the college of dentistry. We needed that money and I'll support Senator Dworak's amendment. But I think that we need to recognize that we have got to take these things one by one. I respect Dr. Sparks and I respect the faculty but I'm going to ask you this question. When you say that these facilities can't be accredited in out-state Nebraska who is going to accredit them? Again we go to medical people. We go to doctors and physicians, and surgeons and they are the ones that say No, we can't train in out-state Nebraska. Facilities aren't adequate. What do you call adequate? We build hospitals
