PRESIDENT: Well first of all do you appeal my ruling? The acceptance of the Clerk of that vote? What are you challenging?

SENATOR MARSH: Mr. President, I'm not challenging, I'm just raising a point of order, because I think that was a poor decision.

PRESIDENT: I have nothing to do with that. We still have a parliamentary problem here. There has been an appeal to the acceptance of a vote. What? Senator Simpson, I appreciate your appeal, and I really don't know if there is a specific rule on this. Why don't you withdraw your appeal and we will both find out over night Senator.

SENATOR SIMPSON: Are you coming over to my place or should I come over to yours? I ask unanimous consent to withdraw it.

PRESIDENT: Alright. Now, who says that I have to rule that way from now on?

CLERK: Now Mr. President, a motion to advance the bill would be in order.

PRESIDENT: Question is shall the bill be advanced? All those in favor say aye, contrary nay. The Chair can not determine the ayes from the nays, so it will be a roll call vote. Record your vote. Have you voted on the advancement of this bill? Record.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 9 nays on the motion to advance.

PRESIDENT: The bill is advanced.

CLERK: Read message from the Governor regarding LB150. (Legislative Journal page 1719)

PRESIDENT: Senator Barnett.

SENATOR BARNETT: Just to tell them that the last flight to Omaha to observe is now loading at the west side and I think everyone has been notified who they are to make this tour so they are loading by the Lincoln Statute right now. Not in the helicopter but the cars to take us out there.

PRESIDENT: Motion to adjourn. All those in favor say aye, contrary nay. We are adjourned.
