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if we're going to adopt the amendment then we better do something. Consequently, one of two things should be done, one of which is to delay the adoption of these amendments ... of this particular amendment on these bills as they go across until we can get this worked out in such a way that it's legal; or not adopt these amendments with the legislative approval being required. Just require the Governor's approval and let it go at that. I frankly would rather see us adopt these amendments with just the Governor's approval and let it go at that. If Senator Cavanaugh would agree to that until we can get this worked out in some other fashion so that it is ... there's no question of the legality of it, I have no qualms about withdrawing my amendment. Would Senator Cavanaugh yield to a question, if he's here somewhere? Oh, there he is. Senator Cavanaugh, are you agreeable to doing that with just the Governor's approval until we can get this worked out?

SENATOR CAVANAUGH: Am I agreeable to doing what?

SENATOR GOODRICH: To putting these amendments on these budget bills calling just for the Governor's approval and not the approval of the Legislature, until such time as we can get together and work this out between us and the Attorney General and anybody else that wants to get involved?

SENATOR CAVANAUGH: Well no. If there's a problem with the provision being in there, my amendment doesn't aggravate or lessen the problem.

SENATOR GOODRICH: Well your amendment that calls for legislative approval of bequests over \$10,000 is the very thing that we're talking about. It's the one that created all this discussion in the first place and creates the problem.

SENATOR CAVANAUGH: That's the one that's unconstitutional? As I understand it Senator Syas and Senator Koch have concerns about the whole section being improper.

SENATOR GOODRICH: That's right. That's what we're saying is that as long as you have the legislature in there ...

SENATOR CAVANAUGH: My position is that if we're going to put it in there it should be in there with my amendment. If it's improper to be in there take it out.

SENATOR GOODRICH: OK. Mr. President, I'm going to ask unanimous consent to withdraw my amendment. I don't think it's really the right thing to do. I think I'll write a new amendment striking the legislative approval requirement out of these amendments. Thank you.

PRESIDENT: Is there an objection to the withdrawal of the amendment? Seeing none, it's so ordered. We're still on the Cavanaugh amendment. Senator Marvel.
