PRESIDENT: All rise for the morning prayer.

CHAPLAIN: Prayer given.

PRESIDENT: Thank you, Dr. Palmer. Record your presence, please. Roll call.

CLERK: A quorum present, Mr. President. Mr. President, Senator Skarda asked to be excused today and Senator Wiltse excused until he arrives.

PRESIDENT: Corrections to the Journal.

CLERK: None, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: The Journal shall stand as read.

CLERK: Mr. President, a communication under date of May 16th addressed to Vincent Brown, Clerk of the Legislature. Read. See Pages 1881 and 1882, Journal. Signed J. James Exon, Governor. Mr. President, a motion on the desk. I move to suspend the Rules and consider on Final Reading LB 212, 305, 344, 571, 571A, 604, 609, 610, 611 and 612 now set for Monday, May 19th today on May 16th. Signed Senator Burbach.

PRESIDENT: Senator Burbach. Senator Burbach.

SENATOR BURBACH: What's that.

PRESIDENT: Well, it is on your motion to suspend the Rules.

SENATOR BURBACH: All right. I hope I have better luck at this than I did yesterday evening.

PRESIDENT: It is very early in the day's session but we should give the Speaker our undivided attention.

SENATOR BURBACH: This is a usual performance, resolution.. motion...performance, if you please. This is necessary to do this this morning so you'd have these bills on Final Reading. We are meeting the Constitutional requirements but under our Rules we have the Rule of having them there three days. The Constitution provides for one day and so, consequently, this is necessary if we want to discuss...or take up on Final Reading at this time this motion. I move for its adoption.
