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SENATOR CLARK: I think there is probably a lot of mis-information going on around the place here. The Governor's staff and our staff had determined that 18 million dollars was for funding. Now, I'll grant you, that is without any capital construction on it, but what he is attempting to do here is to put 11.6 million dollars into it and 1 1/2 mills for operating or 2 mills in it, and you're coming up with about 23 million dollars which is four to five millions dollars more than what the staffs have said would be for funding. It depends on how far you want to go. You talk about local boards having local control, I know all about it. It's kinda like our school boards. They have local control, they know all about everything except the Legislature doesn't think they have any brains to deal with the help that they can hire or anything else. We have to have just cause, and we have to have professional negotiations, we have to have a lot of things. We don't trust the school boards except in places we want to like buying a few pencils and perhaps gasoline and a couple of tires. That's the only place we really trust the school boards, and that's the only thing you're doing here. I think the funding would be right and the Governor's staff has said that 5.2 or three million is going to be all that's required in this particular bill. Don't be misled by thinking they're not going to fund the entire amount. Their original request was for 27 million dollars including their capital construction. So, don't be misled and think they're not going to go the full ball of wax. I've never seen anyone in any kind of a tax situation in education that won't go the full ball of wax.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator Dworak.

SENATOR DWORAK: Mr. Chairman, Senators, I take issue with Senator Lewis. I think if these people have the opportunity to levy up to 2 1/2 mills, that's what they're going to levy. They're going to have to levy it. They're going to have to levy it with the ideas that were presented to this body. We know what kind of construction things they have in mind. We know at Central, we know at Metro Tech and they're going to just actually levy this 2 1/2 mills and I would strongly support the Warner amendment.

PRESIDENT: Senator Kremer.

SENATOR KREMER: Mr. Chairman, I'm going to have to oppose the Warner amendment. The figures that I have if his amendment is adopted, the courses and the work that has been done at the technical schools has got to be curtailed. According to the figures that I have here, it will not, if we are right, and 1 mill only raises 6 million dollars and then the additional 5 point whatever it is that Senator Warner's amendment would provide for would cut it short of a number of million dollars to operate on the level we are now operating in our local community technical colleges. Now, if you look at the projected enrollment in all areas of
