SENATOR SAVAGE: Now Emory Burnett's running this Legislature.

Senator Mahoney, could you tell us about what the Executive Board did today in reference to the resolutions that have got to be considered before this body? Give them some idea of the workload that's staring them in the face in that direction.

SENATOR MAHONEY: Mr. President, we're typing up our total on that. We'll have that ready. But it's not ready until we ... we're putting it together. We've taken action this afternoon, but we will have it ready for discussion sometime on the Speaker's agenda in the next day or two.

SENATOR KOCH: What's before the body right now Mr. Speaker?

SPEAKER: Senator Simpson's motion to suspend the rules.

SENATOR KOCH: Is a point of special privilege in order, personal privilege?

SPEAKER: Proceed.
