PRESIDENT: Senator Luedtke.

SENATOR LUEDTKE: Mr. President, just a correction on your summary of the resolution ceremony. Number 83 must have been introduced by the Public Works Committee. It was not introduced by myself.

SENATOR MAHONEY: Typographical error, Senator. I failed to mention it earlier.

SENATOR LUEDTKE: Typographical error. Was that Public Works? I would assume it was.

SENATOR MAHONEY: Yes it was. Yes sir.

PRESIDENT: Is there any other discussion? Senator Mahoney.

SENATOR MAHONEY: Mr. President, my motion is in order. I ask that a vote be taken for the approval of these resolutions.

PRESIDENT: Alright, the question is the approval of the resolutions, as outlined by Senator Mahoney. Record your vote. Have you voted? Record.

CLERK: 32 ayes, Mr. President, on the adoption of the report from the Executive Board.

PRESIDENT: The motion carries. The resolutions are adopted. Senator Mahoney.

SENATOR MAHONEY: Now, Mr. President, for a few other comments concerning the new legislators that were elected this year and who have not served on interim study committees. The history of the Legislative Resolutions have been that, as a resolution is adopted by this Legislature in many cases as you'll notice on your sheets, they are turned back to the respective committee that you serve on. The chairman of the committee and yourself will get together and decide when it is an opportune time to call for the general meetings, where those meetings are to be held. Some of these meetings are held, customarily, outstate in various towns and cities. Many of them are held right here in the Capitol. The legislators and the chairman then so decide. Sometimes they have more than one or two of these meetings. They call in people who are interested in the areas that the resolution calls for. Because all of us have different work habits and those of us who are from outstate have problems with various farming and ranching duties, the resolutions, as far as having hearings sometimes come later in the Summer. Most of them are held during the Fall. I only make that point of explanation so that the Senators themselves will have knowledge to contact the chairman to discuss with him the dates that are the best for the individual Senators, and then to work together with the committee. There are one or two special committees that were set up for the study of subject matters. For instance you will notice that we have three committees studying the field of post-secondary education. You will note also that in this area of higher education in the special committee we have placed the Chairman of Appropriations, Senator Marvel, the Chairman of Education, Senator Frank Lewis, who are also
