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help ungoof it, I guess, if there is such a word, which I doubt. I don't know what Marvel said but . . . is there such a word? I doubt it. Anyhow you get the point. I'm going to let the special session be called cause he's going to call it anyhow I think. I don't think you're going to save yourself by overriding. Do what you want to do. Do what you want to do.

PRESIDENT: Senator Kremer.

SENATOR KREMER: Mr. Chairman, I think we ought to support the override. I was asked the question this morning is the chairman of the committee that brought this bill out, would I ask for an override. I said I . . . in no way would I ask for it. I warned this group. I think the record will show that I tried my best not to get you to adopt the Chambers amendment. This was the cause of all this. I do not feel that this does have . . . this does have the severability clause. I do not feel that the problem in the bill is the major part of the bill and it can, . . . whoever's responsibility it is, can take that part out of the bill. We'll have a good bill left. I don't know what it's going to cost to bring us back into special session. We'll have to be back 5 days out of 7. It will cost \$25,000 to \$50,000. If we want to save money here's the way to do it. It will save all of us a lot of time too. I think we ought to go for the override. I was unwilling to ask for it.

PRESIDENT: Senator Frank Lewis.

SENATOR F. LEWIS: I rise to defend the Governor. Now he has decided that this bill is a bad bill. After careful scrutiny, working at it in some detail, I've decided he's absolutely correct. We ought to leave this bill right where it is. Since we've been going along so well I think we ought to continue the trend. I rise as strong supporter in opposition to the override of the veto.

PRESIDENT: Senator Simpson.

SENATOR SIMPSON: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, well we got into it again, didn't we. The Governor helped us do it and he's not going to help us get out of it. Now we have about three choices really. So what are you going to do? I really think, to get on the basic end of it, that we got another lousy opinion out of the Attorney General. That's the first thing. That's not the major part of this bill. You have to make the decision now, shall we override or the other two decisions. We can come back and pick up the bill on Select File, amend this bill into it, extend the session about two days, whatever two days you want to use, don't have to be tomorrow or the next day, whatever days you want. Put that bill back on Final Reading and pass it in the form that is necessary. Or, the third alternative, you can sit back and let the Governor call us back into special session. He'll tell you how he wants it done. Now the choice is yours and I'm not going to try to persuade you which way to go. I'm not even going to tell you which way I'm going to vote. I think here it is. Some people say
