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Section 3 defines it ... development requirements of which, under the act, are left with the political subdivision.

Another amendment states that the compliance seals, the units must have, remain on the property of the department subject to the reappropriation in the event of an accident, violations or conditions of insurance.

Section 4 is amended to remove the language specifying that the standards adopted by the department shall include those promulgated by other organizations or groups.

Finally, Section 8 is to amend the authorized political subdivisions to require compliance with the local codes or standards which are not less stringent than established by the state.

I would say, with these amendments in mind, the Committee voted to advance them unanimously. At this time I would ask for the adoption of the committee amendments. I understand there may be some amendments to be offered later. At this time I would ask for the adoption of the committee amendments.

PRESIDENT: Senator Burbach.

SENATOR BURBACH: Mr. President, members of the Legislature. I rise to oppose the committee amendment. In that instance where, as reported out the Committee stated in part that, "no agency in the state of municipal order require compliance with local codes or standards which are different from those established by the Department pursuant to this act". That amendment would say ... the amendment offered ... to change the wording "are different from" to "less stringent than".

Mr. President, members of the Legislature. Let's stop and think about what this entire bill sets up to do. This has to do with the code to be administered by the Department of Health so that all those appliances and the entire mobile home, or whatever type of home we're talking about ... a moveable type of a home, that those standards be set by the Department of Health. The reason for this amendment is to say that in Omaha our code is stricter than we anticipate the state code will be. Therefore, Omaha would have a special code. Let's analyze that for just a moment, a special code. When vehicles of this nature are sold, transported and offered for sale outside the State of Nebraska or even in Nebraska, we have two sets of standards. Let us be hopeful that the Department of Health makes sufficient, strong codes, that we have one code rather than to have a different code in a given area, such as Omaha. Those people who said they were interested in this said that they have a strict code.
