PRESIDENT: So the matter before the House is Senator Cope's motion to advance, which .... Record your vote. Have you voted? Have you all voted? Record. Senator Cope.

SENATOR COPE: I'll have a Call of the House please.

PRESIDENT: The question is shall the House go under Call. Record your vote. Senator Stoney, for what purpose do you ask for recognition?

SENATOR STONEY: I would like to vote aye on the original motion please. I was out of the Chamber.

CLERK: We have to go under Call first.

SENATOR STONEY: Alright.

PRESIDENT: Have you all voted? Record.

CLERK: 21 ayes, 19 nays.

PRESIDENT: Motion fails. Well it's a majority of those present. In the Chair's view there's 46 people here. I beg your pardon? Rules provide for present and voting, so the Chair withdraws its other ruling. We are under Call. That motion did carry. It's a majority of those voting, not a majority of those present.

CLERK: OK, now Mr. President, Larry Stoney votes aye on the original motion. Senator ....

PRESIDENT: First of all, would all Senators please take your chairs and record your presence.

CLERK: Senator DeCamp changing from no to aye.

PRESIDENT: Please take your chairs and record your presence.

CLERK: Carsten voting aye.

PRESIDENT: Senator Frank Lewis moves that the Call be raised. All those in favor say aye, contrary say nay. The Call is raised. Report the vote.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 17 nays on the original motion.

PRESIDENT: The motion carries. The bill is advanced. Chair recognizes Senator Kelly.

SENATOR KELLY: Mr. President, colleagues. I visited with the Speaker to receive his permission to take care of a small, routine matter before lunch, namely LR 108. He has granted that permission. I would, at this time, offer it to the Legislature.

CLERK: Mr. President, the Legislative Resolution is LR 108. It is found in full in the Legislative Journal on page 178.
