but I think that we must recognize that in the days when rural free delivery was established that if we had talked about the cost and the benefits that were to be derived from that service many people would never have allowed the service to have been inaugurated. I think that we all know that many times the postal system today is so bogged down in inefficiencies that we just are going to have to put up with some of this but I think that those of us who rely upon the system to move the mails have a right to demand that it become efficient and that it become the kind of a system that it was a few years ago when you could mail a letter and reasonably expect to find it at its destination in a day or so. I hope that we support the Resolution and that we do find some way to retain service in these small communities that are a very vital part of the State of Nebraska and, of course, the entire United States.

PRESIDENT: You have heard the motion. The question is the adoption of LR 112. Record your vote. Have you voted? Record.

CLERK: 33 ayes, 1 nay, 15 not voting.

PRESIDENT: The Resolution is adopted. Under the South balcony are three family members of Senator Nichol's family. Mr. Tom Ellis, Mrs. Kathy Ellis and Casey Ellis. Thank you for being here. Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: Mr. President, the next matter is LR 113 introduced by Senator Kremer. It is set out on page 318 of the Legislative Journal. Read.

PRESIDENT: Senator Kremer.

SENATOR KREMER: Mr. Chairman, members of the Legislature, I am not going to debate this issue a long, long time. We have debated it time and time again. I believe that everyone of us have already made up our mind how we stand on this controversial issue. It has come before us in times past. I was willing to introduce this Resolution because I firmly believe in what it calls for. I have checked with my own doctors, three of them, at least, and not a single one of them was able to say that I can put my finger on a certain period in the time of the development of an unborn child and say that this is life and this is not life. I believe we are dealing with a basic principle. I believe that it is a principle that is being violated today and I think it is time we have a new look at it. The meat of the Resolution, of course, is in the first two paragraphs set out under the "Therefore" and I call this to the attention of the Legislature. The State of Nebraska hereby requests the Congress of the United States to hold hearings on proposed amendments, proposed amendments to the Constitution of the United States protecting the right of life to the unborn child, and that Congress, number two, be urged to submit the best such proposed amendment in protecting the right to life of the unborn child to the Legislatures of the several
