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and Senator Marsh, that helps those few school teachers with their income tax. Their income tax savings would be very minute compared to the drastic fracturing and disastrous interfering with the standard retirement program for these very same people, plus all of their brother and sister public employees.

I'm not sure of the parliamentary procedure. We should have a kill motion on this bill. If this is not possible, the very best thing we can do then is to vote no on Final Reading because this is a no no bill from the word go. P.S. Senator Lewis stated, in his remarks on the floor, that this certainly isn't anything that the teachers really care about. Maybe most of them don't even know about it. This is really bad legislation.

PRESIDENT: Senator Frank Lewis.

SENATOR F. LEWIS: Mr. Chairman, when it comes to teacher legislation I can almost pinpoint where the opposition comes from. You mention teacher and a couple of Senators are always up. They have not disappointed me this morning.

PRESIDENT: Yes sir, Senator Murphy. State your point.

SENATOR MURPHY: I don't think there's any doubt as to the inference. I think this Legislature is far, far overdue to take steps to request that anyone speaking on this floor speak to the issue and not to the individual. Again I repeat, if you have no basis on which to argue, attack an individual or possibly two. I think it is very bad manners, very poor procedure....

PRESIDENT: Alright, that's enough. Your point is sustained. We'll have no more discussion from either party on the matter. Senator Lewis. State your point, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. Chairman, I think there has been too many attempts to restrict what people can say. Since every man on this floor can speak, I think Senator Murphy's comment was out of order if nothing degrading or demeaning was stated. I'll move to overrule the Chair if you are saying that what Senator Murphy says applies to Senator Lewis' remarks.

PRESIDENT: I sustained his point of order. You're appealing that?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes, I am.

PRESIDENT: Alright. Question is, shall the Chair's sustaining, of Senator Murphy's point of order, be overruled? Now, so that there won't be any confusion about this vote, if you agree with my sustaining you vote yes. If you disagree with sustaining.... Excuse me. Alright. Senator Chambers has appealed my ruling. So the question is, shall the Chair be overruled. If you agree with Senator Chambers then you vote green. Record your vote. Have you voted? Record.
