and that perhaps the right motion would be to advance it and then move to bracket it at that time.

SENATOR F. LEWIS: I move that we advance the bill and bracket it for Friday, whatever Friday is.

PRESIDENT: Yes, I think we should take those separately. The motion is to advance the bill, first, and then it would be proper to discuss the matter of bracketing. Ordinarily, this is handled on a voice vote. Do you wish to speak to the matter of advancement, Senator Marvel, in view of the fact that there will be a motion to bracket after that is over. On the bracketing, all right. Senator Syas' light is on. All right. The question is, shall the bill be advanced? All those in favor say aye. Contrary say no. It is the Chair's determination that the Chair could not determine so, therefore, we will have a record vote on the matter of advancement, and this is just to advance so that you can discuss the matter of bracketing. Record your vote. Record. Record, Mr. Clerk. The bill is advanced. Apparently, the nays had...no, it is a voice vote. I could have declared. It is just whoever... we do it all the time on voice vote. The motion to advance fails. The motion to advance fails. Senator Kelly, for what purpose do you arise?

SENATOR KELLY: A point of information of the Chair.

PRESIDENT: Yes, sir.

SENATOR KELLY: Mr. President, LB 76 has been a real difficult bill for some unknown reason for us to operate with and I am sure that it is my ineptness and the parliamentary procedures against a master in this area. Will you please instruct me as a member of this body how it is that I can get a kill motion on this vote, arguments on a kill motion and a vote on a kill motion?

PRESIDENT: No.

SENATOR KELLY: Thank you.

CLERK: There is nothing else can be done to it.

PRESIDENT: LB 412.

CLERK: Mr. President, LB 412. Mr. President, there were no E & R amendments. There is presently pending on the bill a motion by Senator Cavanaugh to indefinitely postpone the bill.

PRESIDENT: Senator Cavanaugh. Senator Cavanaugh.

SENATOR CAVANAUGH: Yes. This is a motion to kill LB 412 which provides that appeals to the Liquor Commission in which there is not a protest filed can only be heard in Lancaster County. Now we debated this once before and I think some of the outstate Senators maybe the issue really didn't soak in as to what is happening here but I can't imagine anybody thinking that it is more efficient or expeditious for their constituents to have to come to
