CLERK: Mr. President, I don't have a specific amendment but I have a motion to return LB 585 to Select File for a specific amendment.

PRESIDENT: Alright. Whose motion? Senator Luedtke, do you want that to lay over?

SENATOR LUEDTKE: ... over a day. Yes, but I want the bill to be laid over for.... The amendment ... I'll tell you what the amendment is so that you know.

PRESIDENT: But you want to have your motion to return today though.

SENATOR LUEDTKE: That's correct.

PRESIDENT: OK.

SENATOR LUEDTKE: That's absolutely correct.

PRESIDENT: Chair recognizes Senator Luedtke.

SENATOR LUEDTKE: Mr. President, I move that the bill be brought back. The amendment that I want to put on it is an amendment to clarify when an appraiser is to be used in the appraisal of real estate in a probate estate. There was an amendment. The Duis amendment was. It's ambiguous as to when this would apply. We want to clarify the wording so that we're very sure when this would apply.

PRESIDENT: You ask unanimous consent to....

SENATOR LUEDTKE: I move to hold it so it won't go any place.

PRESIDENT: Till when?

SENATOR LUEDTKE: We'll have it ... I can do it tomorrow.

PRESIDENT: OK. There's a request for unanimous consent to hold the bill. Is there an objection? Seeing none, it's so ordered.

CLERK: Mr. President, it's on page 522, LR 117.

PRESIDENT: Senator Burbach. LR 117.

SENATOR BURBACH: Resolution 117 is printed in the Journal. It was introduced the day before yesterday.

CLERK: It's found on page 522 of the Legislative Journal. Read title.

SENATOR BURBACH: Mr. President, members of the Legislature. We've all become accustomed, whether it be at the local school house level or at the township and county level or the state level or any level of government, that we have come to accept the idea of revenue sharing. If this were to be broken off immediately without a possible even phase-out or if this were to occur it would put the state and all the political subdivisions in extremely tough positions.
