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thoroughly discussed at the hearing and I am sure that there are persons that were not there who may have wished they were there, but I doubt that very few bills have had the thorough airing that this bill has had, public hearing or not. So, therefore, if there are any questions, I would be glad to answer them. Otherwise, I would move the adoption.

PRESIDENT: Any further discussion? Senator Murphy.

SENATOR MURPHY: I wonder if Senator Schmit would have an objection to laying this over until these amendments can be fitted in. Quite sincerely, Senator, I am not a bit sure where this leads me and I wonder if you would have any particular objection to doing this Monday.

SENATOR SCHMIT: I have no objection, Mr. President.

SENATOR MURPHY: Thank you.

PRESIDENT: What, bracket this until next Wednesday?

SENATOR SCHMIT: Pardon.

PRESIDENT: Bracket it until when?

SENATOR MURPHY: Just lay it over until Monday, that would be fine.

PRESIDENT: All right. Is there an objection to that request by Senator Schmit. Seeing none, it is so ordered, that is, the bill shall be laid over until Monday. We move to LB 579 on General File.

CLERK: LB 579 introduced by Senator Frank Lewis for the Governor. Read title. Mr. President, there are no Committee amendments on the bill. There are a series of other bills offered...series of other amendments offered. The first one appears to be offered by Senator Frank Lewis. It is found on page 1787 of last year's Journal.

SENATOR F. LEWIS: Read that one to me, Vince.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator Lewis.

SENATOR F. LEWIS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, this bill was offered by me last session on behalf of the Governor and the Governor working with the 1202 Commission, which was created in statute, in an attempt to coordinate higher education, the Governor and the 1202 Commission and others, including myself, felt like there is a need for coordination of higher education. In all candid, the bill is not as strong as I would like it to be. This is still a volatary coordination but hopefully we think it might work under the basis...we think it might work under the basis that if the Governor appoints strong people to the Commission, it might be most affective. The bill sets out the duties of the members of the Commission. There would be fifteen members on the Commission, nine to be
