have to be fenced because if that happens to be on the edge of a meadow that he wants to graze, how is he going to leave it out of production if he don't fence it and that fence nowadays is going to cost him a lot of money. Senator Mahoney refers to the swamp. Those swamps dry up. Right now we are in the tail end of about a five year drought out there and our wet meadows are drying up. They have been good habitat for the birds. The birds will find out a place to go. They can go around the lakes. We will have to have that wet meadow for haying and for grazing in the fall. The policing powers, Senator Syas says it will be the farmer himself. I don't know whether that would work or not. The game warden, the county assessor, who is going to police this thing and see that the farmer doesn't use it, because if it comes down to whether or not his cattle are going to get hungry or not, he is going to use it. I think this bill has been debated back and forth. Every phase of it has been talked about. We are saving water. The water out in our country, the sandhills, you talk about where all this water is. Our lakes are drying up. Not the big lakes, but the small lakes are all going down. We can't save water until we get a few wet seasons, get a little rain and then we will have plenty of water. I would hope that we get rid of this bill now and not have to worry about it later, because if this bill goes on and a fellow puts his land in tax free, it may take another constitutional amendment to get it back so that he can use it again. Thank you.
