Extension Services, you allow their money to be used for research, to be used for the Business College, to be used for anything that they deem necessary on that campus and you destroy the University of Nebraska Lincoln Extension Services which is a mighty important thing in this state, yet the Budget Committee who is screaming danger at lump sum appropriations, did just that with one of the most important services that we have to the non-college people in this state out of the University of Nebraska, and at the same time, they come back and they protect the identity of SUN leaving it as a separate University in the Systems office to grow and grow and grow so that each year the Budget Committee can come back to the Legislature and condemn the growth of the SUN program. Now SUN is no different, in my mind, than extension and they should be in the same pool competing for the same money. The people that are in Extension in the University Nebraska Lincoln are going to have something to say about the money that goes to SUN, if they are all in the same, 711, program and that is going to be a control on SUN that you do not have and you're waving the red flag of danger is actually waving a white flag of surrender. You have surrendered your responsibilities if you do not accept this amendment to saying, well, there isn't anything we can do about SUN anyway and we want to watch it grow so we can complain about it conversely. When it is in 711 and it gets the same budgetary treatment, it gets the same competition for the same money and the budget analysts all get a look at those computer printouts of the books that are kept on the various programs, we can tell what is spent. If we couldn't, why would we give a lump sum to the University in the first place, because when we get that report back from the Lincoln campus this next year, the lump sum that is in 711 will all be broken down into how every dollar was spent. SUN will come in all by itself from the Systems office as though it were on an equal footing with the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. You all know that that is incorrect. You should support my amendment so that we can have an idea that the extension services at the University of Nebraska at Lincoln are not going to be destroyed.
