PRESIDENT: Record your vote. Record.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 7 nays on the motion to adopt, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: The amendment is adopted.

CLERK: I now have another motion, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Yes.

CLERK: I move to indefinitely postpone LB 464. Signed, Senator Chambers.

PRESIDENT: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. Chairman, members of the Legislature. Just for the record, I've talked to a number of you today and I said I wouldn't take a long time so I won't. I'll call for the question.

PRESIDENT: Five seconds? The question is shall debate cease. Record your vote. Record.

CLERK: 30 ayes, 2 nays to cease debate, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Debate ceases. The question is shall this bill be indefinitely postponed. Record your vote. Have you voted? Please vote. Have you all voted? All voted? Record. Yes Senator DeCamp.

SENATOR DeCAMP: Mr. President, how many are excused?

CLERK: We only have three excused, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: There are only three officially excused. I'm going to ask the Clerk to report the vote if we don't get some action.

SENATOR DeCAMP: Forget it.

PRESIDENT: Report the vote.

CLERK: 22 ayes, 19 nays to indefinitely postpone, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: The bill is indefinitely postponed.

LB 590. Yes sir, Senator Burbach.

SENATOR BURBACH: Do you have a comment on that, Senator Murphy?

PRESIDENT: Yes sir, Senator.
