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this law suit, or what they are going to talk about and water problems that they have in Wyoming is going to try and stop the construction, the generation plant which Lincoln is going to draw some of its energy off of. Now, am I in the right direction? Is this the plant that we are talking about and will this stop it from being constructed?

SENATOR KREMER: No sir. I'll give you the information on that. There are two other ways that we can accomplish exactly what you want. I'm not saying that I support what Lincoln did in going to Wyoming in a joint venture, but, our program is going to do two things two ways. We can store additional water in the Semitol Reservation. It will give us the same amount of water that we have got now, or we can ask them to use a different method of cooling, that is a straight through cooling rather than the tower cooling which consumes 30 million acre feet. Either way will work, and that is the plan right now. Some of us will be going to Wyoming the 19th and try to resolve that problem.

SENATOR BARNETT: In other words you are saying that if you do have litigation in this area of which you are talking about in Wyoming, it is not to stop the construction of this generating plant.

SENATOR KREMER: Senator Barnett, water and energy are so closely tied together that you must simply call them twins. We have got to have generation of power. We can not stop the building of power plants. I am not saying that Lincoln did the right thing.. but they did and..

SENATOR BARNETT: We had to do something. Some people didn't want us to do anything except open up the roofs and let the sun shine in and that isn't going to work either.

SENATOR KREMER: I think that you could have gone east instead of west, where it is closer to home, but that is besides the point.

SENATOR BARNETT: I just wanted to make sure that you were not going to start a law suit to stop the construction, because I was a little bit interested in it if it affected Lincoln.

SENATOR KREMER: No Senator Barnett. We will try to talk across the table with the Wyoming people and ask them to go along with us in storing more water in Semitol, and we can do this. But under the present law and under the present agreement we can not, but on certain arrangements we can. We also can use a different method of cooling where the water will be returned to the flow, and not be consumed through evaporation.

SENATOR BARNETT: Mr. President, I would like to yield the balance of my time, or a couple of minutes of my time which I have left to Senator Fowler for a couple more questions.
