

from both of those people. There is nobody, in my opinion, looking out after the patient who is in the middle. We're inconveniencing the pharmacists, we're inconveniencing the physician. We are protecting the patient, and please remember that as you vote. I too have received calls on "the Kelly amendments" as disastrous to LB 103. There are those who say today that if the pharmacist would have to inform the doctors office so that the doctors record could be accurate, that that would literally kill this bill. I'm telling Senator Burrows that this bill has been worked on by hundreds of people. If one safeguard, in standard medical practice would kill this bill, my, oh my, those people sure flunked their work. They should have all stayed home. The very charge that, something that would make a record of what is going on with a human life would kill a bill, just don't you believe that whatsoever. I just have one question to ask in my closing and it would go like this, how many of you who have gone to a doctor and the doctors office and visited with that doctor and the doctor treated you without your medical record with him in his hand? In many instances, and I mean many, many instances that doctor must have your medical record in his hand or he won't know who you are. He gets that information as he gets the record and you're coming into his office, and that is his whole library on the state of your health. I would certainly urge that you have in that record, that the doctor will be using to treat your health, the substitution that the pharmacist made on the prescription that the doctor sent to protect your health. I urge the adoption of the amendment to LB 103.

I would like to make one little statement here from a person that I know very well that has been taking medicine for some time for arthritis. She can hardly get around. She's up in years. She has been buying 100 tablets for \$16.00. She got a prescription from her doctor, went to a neighboring town, this was out in Western Nebraska, where there was a larger drugstore, she got the same prescription for \$2.95. That is reason enough that we should have
