

SENATOR DWORAK: Senator Cope, I cannot answer that. The bill, as I intended it, I only was addressing myself to cities of the first class. I did not look into villages of the second class. I honestly cannot answer that question because I don't know the answer.

SENATOR COPE: Okay, thank you.

PRESIDENT: Do you want to close on your motion, Senator Dworak?

SENATOR DWORAK: I move the bill be advanced. If there is a problem with second class cities and villages, which I don't think there is because there is..nobody came forward at the hearing, we can correct that problem on E & R initial.

PRESIDENT: The question is the advancement of the bill. Record your vote. Please vote. Record.

CLERK: 28 ayes, 1 nay.

PRESIDENT: The bill is advanced. LB 190.

CLERK: Read title to LB 190. There are no committee amendments or other amendments pending.

PRESIDENT: Senator Lamb.

SENATOR LAMB: Mr. Chairman, members of the Legislature. This is a bill that removes the requirement that the physician member of the Board of Health, in first and second class cities, removes the requirement that he has to be a resident of the city. It allows these cities of first and second class to have a legal Board of Health. There are some situations where the physician lives outside the city limits. I move that LB 192 be advanced to E & R initial.

PRESIDENT: Senator Newell.

SENATOR NEWELL: Would Senator Lamb rise to a question?

SENATOR LAMB: Yes sir.

SENATOR NEWELL: Senator Lamb, the purpose of this bill, as I understand it, is to allow a physician, who may live outside of a second class city,....

SENATOR LAMB: First and second.

SENATOR NEWELL: ...first and second class city, to serve on the Board of Health. Is that correct?

SENATOR LAMB: Correct.

SENATOR NEWELL: The next question I'd ask is there any mileage requirements? I understand that you may not have enough MD's within a city to serve, and that you might want to find somebody outside. Is there anything to prevent, say in a first class city like Hastings, is there anything to prevent an Omaha doctor from serving on that Board of Health?

SENATOR LAMB: Not under the bill, no.
