PRESIDENT: Senator George.

SENATOR GEORGE: Mr. President, I have a question of Senator Duis, if he would yield. Senator Duis, I am in favor of your amendment but I just have one question. If we take the Nebraska income tax off, could it happen to somebody in the armed forces, for instance, being stationed in Maryland that then the State of Maryland would say, okay, you are not paying an income tax in the State of Nebraska, now you will pay to the State of Maryland? Is that a possibility?

SENATOR DUIS: That is an entire possibility, whereas the State of Nebraska could do that to anyone who is here, too, using the services of this state.

SENATOR GEORGE: My question really is that if we remove the obligation to pay a Nebraska state income tax and that particular GI is stationed in Texas or Maryland and then they put it on, then what is the savings to anybody?

SENATOR DUIS: Merely that the State of Nebraska is not levying it, whereas, the State of Nebraska could turn around and do the same thing if they so desired to those who were exempt in their particular state.

SENATOR GEORGE: But, in other words, there is no guarantee that once we take off the Nebraska state income tax, some other state might not get into the void and then dump somebody else's income tax on that particular Nebraskan, right?

SENATOR DUIS: That is absolutely correct, Senator.

SENATOR GEORGE: Thank you.

PRESIDENT: Senator Cullan.

SENATOR CULLAN: Mr. Chairman, Mr. President, I move the previous question.

PRESIDENT: Do I see five seconds? The motion dies for want of a second. Senator Dworak.

SENATOR DWORAK: I have a question of Senator Duis, if he would yield, please. Senator Duis, I apologize. I was in another meeting and I apologize. I don't know what we are doing. It is my understanding that you are trying to take the stipulation of a service man that has been in the service for one year from paying any state income tax, is this correct?

SENATOR DUIS: If he is out of the State of Nebraska for over one taxable year and he is in active duty.

SENATOR DWORAK: Even though he could be getting a significant amount of his income from Nebraska because he is still a resident of Nebraska.

SENATOR DUIS: No, the intent here is on that pay that he
