

because I know that sooner or later we are going to have difficulty across the State of Nebraska and that all banks in Nebraska should have the same prerogative. In regard to other legislation here, in regard to being somewhat of a dictator, I could recite you the litany of the various bills that went to their doom in the Banking Committee over the years which have since been resurrected which have found their way across the Board and have become an excellent part of Nebraska statutes. I would hope that, you know, none of us are all virtuous and none of us are all bad. I am probably worse than most of you but there ought to be a little bit of streak of kindness in humanity in even a guy like myself and I would hope that from time to time when I have been lambasted and ridiculed on this floor relative to this bill that you believe me when I tell you that I do it for the entire State of Nebraska. I do it for a bank in my legislative district. I do it for every bank which has to do business in the State of Nebraska but mostly I do it for the customers of those banks. I do it, as Senator Frank Lewis says, for my 74 year old mother who can drive up to Mr. Peck and Don Dworak's bank in Columbus and not have to get out of the bank and who could not have done so if it had not been for the passage of 312 which was vigorously opposed by many people on this floor. So I suggest to you, let's leave LB 77 alone. It has had a most difficult life and it certainly has not become law yet but it is a good bill. It is a good bill the way it is drafted. It will do the job that has to be done. It will identify for once and all what constitutes an attached teller facility. An attached teller facility should be the same whether it is in the metropolitan city of Omaha or whether it is in downtown Bellwood,.

Now when the indefinitely postpone motion was made and discussion, no one asked the question, who will it really affect if the bill does not pass. One institution. It is not going to affect institutions in Lincoln. Some of you have been led to believe so. Not one. There is not one institution in Lincoln that would allow that except if the bill goes through
