CLERK: Yes, Mr. President. Mr. President, a communication from the Executive office under date of March 23rd. Read. (See pages 1009-1011, Journal.) Mr. President, accompanying the letter then are two bills, LB 521 introduced by Senator Roland Luedtke at the request of the Governor. Read title. Also, Mr. President, LB 522 introduced by Senator Roland Luedtke at the request of the Governor. Read title. Mr. President, there is an Attorney General's opinion which will be inserted in the Journal identified as #49 addressed to Senator Koch. (See pages 1011-1014, Journal.) Mr. President, Senator Duis asks unanimous consent to bracket LB 355 until tomorrow.

PRESIDENT: Is there an objection? Seeing none, it is so ordered.

CLERK: Mr. President, Government Committee gives notice of an Executive session Thursday at 1:15 p.m. Mr. President, your committee on Enrollment and Review reports we have examined and reviewed LB 459 and recommend it be replaced on Select File as amended; LB 419 replaced on Select File as amended; LB 481 replaced on Select File as amended. Signed Senator Cullan, Chairman. Mr. President, Senator Stony asks unanimous consent to print amendments in the Journal to LB 228.

PRESIDENT: Is there an objection? So ordered.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator DeCamp asks unanimous consent to print amendments to LB 220.

PRESIDENT: Is there an objection? So ordered.

CLERK: Mr. President, I move for the introduction of the attached bill. Signed Senator Dworak. It is a bill introduced by the Miscellaneous Subjects Committee relating to crimes and punishments, to make it a crime to accept a fee, directly or indirectly, for anything of value to be wagered, transmitted, or delivered for wager in any pari-mutuel system of wagering on horses.

PRESIDENT: Senator Dworak.

SENATOR DWORAK: Mr. President, colleagues, as Chairman of the Miscellaneous Subjects Committee urge to the suspension of the rules so that we can introduce LB 833. The specifics are known by Senator Lewis and I would like to yield to Senator Lewis to give you the specifics of this particular piece of legislation. I think we really need to take a look at this.

PRESIDENT: Senator, you don't need to suspend the rules. You simply need 30 votes. Senator Frank Lewis.

SENATOR F. LEWIS: Mr. President, I was asked to introduce the bill on behalf of a number of people including the interest of Douglas County Attorney, Don Knowles, Aksarben. I have before me a complete study of the Legislature, the General Assembly of Illinois, on race track messenger services. There is an extreme concern about the operation. The Legislature ought to look into it. Mr. Skochdopole of Aksarben has been in Illinois studying along with the Illinois
