

I would urge the body who is concerned about the problem that this is a reasonable alternative and to support this amendment.

PRESIDENT: Senator Keyes.

SENATOR KEYES: Mr. Speaker, I want to have Senator John DeCamp comment on Section 6 on page 3. I'll read it to you and tell you what an impossibility that is, that there will never be any garbage disposal or anything in eastern Nebraska at all. "A site shall be located at least one thousand five hundred feet from any public or domestic water supply or well, any public water supply water intake from a body of static water, or one mile upstream or one thousand feet downstream from a river intake." Any drop of water that falls in Sarpy or Douglas County that happens to be one drop more than will soak into the ground runs off and runs into the Platte River or it runs into the Missouri River and absolutely under that condition, you could never put anything in eastern Nebraska. There is no way that the water does anything, the surplus, but run into the river. Everbody knows that and whoever drafted that for you, I think, you should go to them and say, that's a physical impossibility.

SENATOR DECAMP: Without giving a lot of filibuster on it, you misinterpreted the section. You're talking about an intake point outlet to the river, however, I've gone over that with Senator Goodrich and all those that have grave, grave, grave concerns about this anyway can rest assured they are not going to let anything in there that really becomes an impossibility or unreality. We do have some other amendments from Senator Goodrich. But as I say, I think you misinterpreted that particular section. I appreciate you raising the point.

PRESIDENT: Senator Barnett.

SENATOR BARNETT: Mr. President and members of the Legislature. I would like to ask Senator DeCamp a question. When we started out on this bill, John, on 182, it was an Omaha problem. Now from the definition on Section 4, you've made it a problem for about everybody in the state. You said you've talked to Goodrich and people like this. Have you talked to anybody from Lincoln? Is this their bill? Is this maybe their law? What I'm trying to find out, John, is there any reason or any opposition to the fact that if we would move to adopt your amendments and as Senator Chambers has said he hasn't had time to look at them. We haven't either. Can we hold it over, bracket it till Monday or Tuesday and get a chance to look at it over the weekend? Do you object to that?

SENATOR DECAMP: I don't know. We've jacked around with this thing so long. The whole idea was the amendments take a little different approach. Senator Venditte's original bill basically banned or outlawed the use of a balefill through the various restrictions. What this approach does is basically allow it and define what balefill is and set standards that they have to operate under. I think there is fairly uniform opinion in the body at this time that Senator Venditte's original approach doesn't have the lift
