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do is there is apparently some leeway in the federal law that would allow us to, under certain circumstances, petition the Department of Roads and the Federal Department of Transportation to keep some of these signs rather than tear them all down and spend a lot of money that way. You know we had a couple of bills this year proposed on lodging tax so we can advertise and tell people we've got tourist facilities and these things. At the same time we got legislation on the books that's wiping everything out that tells them. So this is designed to solve that particular problem. Also Mr. Tom Doyle of the Department of Roads contacted me about this. We discussed it, and he, once the bill is introduced, etc., he's going to bring in probably an amendment to solve what he said would be a problem, would make the tree cutting look like a Sunday picnic. That, apparently, involves some 10,000 or more permits that are going to have to be issued from everybody that's got a directional sign or whatever out in the country. He wants to resolve that some way so he doesn't have that problem. That bill would probably be used for that purpose too. I'd ask for introduction of the bill.

SENATOR MARVEL: The motion, by Senator DeCamp, is to gain request of the Legislature to introduce the bill. Is there any further discussion? All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. It takes 30 votes. Voting aye, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: Senator Marvel voting aye.

SENATOR MARVEL: Have you all voted? Have you all voted? Once more, have you all voted? Clerk, record.

CLERK: 31 ayes, 0 nays on motion to introduce.

SENATOR MARVEL: Motion carries. The bill is introduced.

CLERK: Mr. President, a motion on the desk. I move to introduce the attached bill. Signed, Senator Maresh. By the Business and Labor Committee. It's Request Number 836.

SENATOR MARVEL: Chair recognizes Senator Maresh.

SENATOR MARESH: Mr. President, members of the Legislature. Request 836 was brought to our attention by Senator Newell. The employment agencies and the Department of Labor have agreed that there should be some clarification and some changes made in the present law. They both agree on this legislation. I will allow Senator Dave Newell, who brought this to the Committee, to explain the need for this bill.

SENATOR MARVEL: Chair recognizes Senator Newell.

SENATOR NEWELL: This is really the first time all year long that I can honestly say that I'm trying to introduce a non-controversial piece of legislation. People can understand my honesty when I admit it is the first time. The bill, basically, does this, it deregulates a number of departments, a number of employment agencies which promote the practice of trying to get the employer to pay for the fee. It deregulates a number of other areas that they do not need regulation in. It basically has the support of all parties concerned. They want it to expedite this bill. I urge the introduction.
