SENATOR CHAMBERS: Neither of us is saying, neither Senator Luedtke or I is saying it's OK to use it. What we're saying is that the Supreme Court decisions have indicated you can't make the mere use of something like this, in my opinion, a crime.

SENATOR BARNETT: OK, thank you.

PRESIDENT: Any reply Senator Chambers? The question is the adoption of this amendment. Record your vote. Please vote. Have you voted? Could I have your attention please? We have an amendment. Record. Senator Shirley Marsh.

SENATOR MARSH: Mr. President, I ask for a call of the House please.

PRESIDENT: The question is shall the House go under call. Record your vote. Have you voted? Record.

CLERK: 28 ayes, 0 nays to go under call.

PRESIDENT: We are under call. All senators please return to your desks and record your presence.

CLERK: ...voting aye. Senator Labeledz voting aye. (Machine turned off for first vote by Clerk).

PRESIDENT: Please record your presence. We are under call. Senator Moylan.

CLERK: Warner voting aye.

PRESIDENT: Senator Rumery voting aye; changing from no to aye Senator Rumery?

CLERK: Senator Cope voting no.

PRESIDENT: Senator Boughn voting aye.

CLERK: Senator Moylan, did you wish to vote aye?

PRESIDENT: Senator Hefner voting aye.

CLERK: Senator Hefner voting. Senator Moylan voting.

PRESIDENT: Senator Simon moves that the call be raised. Clear the board. The question is shall the call be raised. Record your vote. Have you voted? Record.

CLERK: 21 ayes, 0 nays.

PRESIDENT: The call is raised. Report the vote.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 7 nays.

PRESIDENT: The amendment passes. What is next?

CLERK: Mr. President, do you want to withdraw...

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
