

SPEAKER LUEDTKE: Motion to indefinitely postpone. It lays over a day. Senator Chambers, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I move that we suspend the rule and take up his motion now.

SPEAKER LUEDTKE: Motion by Senator Chambers to suspend the rules and take up the motion at this time. No further debate. Senator Chambers, that your opening and closing? All those in favor...it requires 30 votes to suspend the rules so we could take up the motion to kill right now. All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted? Record. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Call of the House.

SPEAKER LUEDTKE: Call of the House has been called for. All those in favor of call of the House vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted? This is on a motion for call of the House. Have you all voted? Record.

CLERK: 16 ayes, 15 nays.

SPEAKER LUEDTKE: We are under call. Record your presence. All senators get to their desks. Sergeant-at-Arms round up those that are outside and let's get a final vote on this. There are a great number of senators who have not been excused. They are either in their offices or in the rotunda or someplace around. Get them in here. Has everybody recorded their presence? Would all senators please get to their desks, stay at their desks until we get a vote? 8 are excused. Senator Chambers, shall we proceed? 8 are excused and we have 9. Do you want us to take the call, Senator Chambers, or did you wish a...roll call vote now on the suspension of the rules. The motion is to suspend the rules so we can take up a motion to indefinitely postpone LB 162 at this time. Call the roll. Senator Mills...

CLERK: Roll call vote on page 1565 of the Journal.

SPEAKER LUEDTKE: Motion is to raise the call. All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay.

CLERK: 22 ayes, 0 nays to raise the call.

SPEAKER LUEDTKE: The call is raised. Report the vote.

CLERK: 19 ayes, 18 nays on the original motion.

SPEAKER LUEDTKE: Motion to suspend the rules fails. The bill will be put over for one day pending a motion to kill by Senator Newell. The motion to kill will be then tomorrow.
