SENATOR KEYES: I discussed this with him and last year when I was up in Dakota and they were bringing hay in from Canada through North Dakota and South Dakota they were hauling them extra width, I called Governor Exon and asked him to make some kind of a dissertation so that we could haul wide loads to help supply the hay for Minnesota where it was extra dry and they did that on a piece meal basis. I would like to make it so you wouldn't have to get a permit.

SENATOR GEORGE: Anyway I would interpret your remarks that the Department of Roads is aware of that.

SENATOR KEYES: Oh, yes.

SENATOR GEORGE: And, that there are no objections.

PRESIDENT: Alright, any close? Okay, vote. Record.

CLERK: 27 ayes, 0 nays.

PRESIDENT: The Keyes amendment is adopted. Senator Cullan.

SENATOR CULLAN: Mr. President, members of the Legislature. I move that LB427 as amended be advanced to E & R for Engrcssment.

PRESIDENT: Discussion? All in favor say aye, contrary say nay. The bill is advanced.

CLERK: Mr. President, I have a series of communications to read into the Journal. Read communication from Governor Exon. Letter appears on pages 1645 of the Legislative Journal.

Mr. President, Senator Kelly asks unanimous consent to print amendments to LB533. Senator Koch asks unanimous consent to print amendments to 532. Senator Murphy moves that LB45 become law notwithstanding the objection of the Governor. That needs to be laid over Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Senator Schmit, do you want to proceed with... Senator Cullan you have no objection of taking up this first amendment if we then rebracket it? The bill is bracketed but we can handle your amendment Senator.

SENATOR SCHMIT: Mr. President, I would rather move to unbracket the bill. I was not in accord with the bracket motion until Friday, I would not object to bracketing for one day, but do not want to bracket it for that long? Do you need it bracketed for Friday, Sam?

PRESIDENT: Senator Cullan.

SENATOR CULLAN: Mr. President, members of the Legislature. I am working on amendments to the elections. I supplied all of the members of the legislature with possible amendments which would establish an election for the members of the Wheat Commission earlier this week. Since then we have reviewed those amendments with the Secretary of State and have sent them to the Department of Agriculture. We see some technical problems with the way that it would operate.
