LB 204A, 542

PRESIDENT: The bill is advanced.

CLERK: Now Mr. President, LB 204A there are E & R amendments.

PRESIDENT: Senator Cullan.

SENATOR CULLAN: (inaudible).

PRESIDENT: The question is shall the E & R amendments to 204A be adopted. All in favor say aye. Contrary say nay. They are adopted.

CLERK: Alright Mr. President, there is an amendment offered by Senator Mills. (read Mills amendment).

PRESIDENT: Senator Mills.

SENATOR MILLS: Mr. President, this amendment is in conjunction with the other amendments that have been offered. The program has been offered by the Governors budget and program 365. It allows \$1,100,000, the A bill, 204A, should come in compliance. I believe that it is only \$500,000 or \$550 and it amends that amount, inserts the amount \$1,100,000 as provided in the Governor's budget request. I would ask you to adopt this amendment and move the bill.

PRESIDENT: Record your vote. Please vote.

CLERK: 28 ayes, 0 nays on the motion to adopt the Mills amendment.

PRESIDENT: The amendment is adopted. Senator Cullan, is there any more Mr. Clerk?

CLERK: None.

SENATOR CULLAN: Mr. President, members of the legislature I move that LB 204A as amended be advanced to E & R for Engrossment.

PRESIDENT: All in favor say aye, opposed nay. The bill is advanced.

CLERK: Alright the next bill Mr. President is LB 542. There has been pending for several days a motion by Senator Duis to indefinitely postpone the bill. That motion was made on May 4th and laid over. So it is properly before the legislature.

PRESIDENT: Alright. Senator Herb Duis.

SENATOR DUIS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature. I asked for the indefinite postponement of LB 542 because it was to fund legislative bill 199 that I introduced. I see no reason for this funding because when I had the bill drawn, when I had the bill drafted so there wouldn't be any work particularly connected with the workmen's compensation courts. If you will note on page 5 of your final reading of LB 199 it merely calls for such waiver shall be in writing and filed with the secretary of the corporation and the Nebraska Workmen's Compensation Court.
