

to qualify for the act. So please don't let's box ourselves in by limiting the scope of the projects the Governor may utilize and, secondly, we must give him specific authorization appropriation authority which this does. Now if you accept Senator Duis' amendment, you strike (a) and you eliminate that specific earmarking and authorization of this project so I urge you in all seriousness inspite a slight slip of the tongue which Senator Newell has been talking to me lately about certain concepts that he has relating to congressional races and I fell into his trap but I am serious in hoping you will oppose this amendment because we do need specific authorization or appropriation language so the Governor can really submit these projects and we can get the money.

PRESIDENT: Senator Simon asks that debate cease. Do I see five seconds? I do. Record your vote. Have you all voted? Have you all voted? The question is, shall debate cease? Record.

CLERK: 27 ayes, 1 nay.

PRESIDENT: Debate shall cease. Senator Duis, would you close with your reply.

SENATOR DUIS: Yes, Mr. President and members of the Legislature, we do not need (a) and (b) in here, if we need anything, because the original part of it, the first part, and then the following, because actually the amendment is drawn improperly. I think in front of the word "all receipts" it should be another section because it ties itself into section (b) and I do feel as though this was drawn improperly which, of course, can be corrected some way. But I would suggest we take subsection (a) out of here and leave the direction only.

PRESIDENT: The question is the adoption of Senator Duis' amendment. Record your vote. Have you voted? Have you all voted? Record.

CLERK: 15 ayes, 11 nays.

PRESIDENT: Motion fails. Select File. Sorry about that, Senator.

CLERK: Now, Mr. President, we have the Bereuter amendment as amended by the Kelly amendment still pending. The Bereuter amendment was amended by the Kelly amendment.

PRESIDENT: All right. Now, Senator Brennan. Senator Frank Lewis.

SENATOR F. LEWIS: Mr. President, I again rise to oppose the Bereuter amendment and let me say one more time that you are putting this controversial amendment that a number of us cannot buy on a highly suspect bill in terms of where the votes are and I am telling you here and now that that section could jeopardize some of the other projects in that bill because it is that important to a number of us. Now I believe that we ought to do something
