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One, I would answer Senator Carsten's question, I think it was a fair question, I have been to Peru State College and I have visited the campus. The facilities there are absolutely deplorable, they are meager, old and inadequate. At the same time, I think that we as legislators have to look at some things that Senator Schmit brought forth, we are now facing a situation where we are continually declining in enrollment. We have many educational facilities that educate quite a number of good teachers. Many of those, a high percentage of them can not find employment in the teaching profession. We have to look at the state's legitimate needs, not based on tradition but what those legitimate needs are. I think that this amendment talks about a problem. I'm not sure that this is the way to do it, that maybe what we ought to do instead is maybe look at the commission and look at long term needs, and look and see whether or not we can afford as many of these colleges, state colleges that are primarily teacher colleges that we have today. I'm not saying that Peru is the one we ought to look at, I think that we ought to look at all of them. I think that we ought to look at the capacity of the other state schools, but I am talking about a problem that we face in Nebraska. Too many teachers and not enough jobs. Too many state dollars spent to educate future teachers. Or too many teachers and not enough jobs. Senator Schmit is absolutely correct and I think that that has got to be addressed somewhere down the road. Senator Bereuter has eloquently said that no matter whether this is a college or whatever it is, the cities are not likely to give up those facilities. I think that is very true. I don't think that if we make a decision down the road that we are going to let those buildings stand idle if we decide maybe that the school is not necessary or whether we decide it is Chadron or Wayne or one of those (inaudible) college of education is unnecessary. I think that we do have to look at, legitimately, at what Senator Rasmussen is bringing up that we have a problem that the needs and legitimacy has got to be analyzed. The priorities have got to be (inaudible) There is not unlimited funds and there is not unlimited dollars. We do have to set priorities and we do have to spend the money where it is best utilized. We have very legitimate needs in this state and we have got to address those needs. But, we do not have unlimited dollars, we do not have unlimited tax payer support and those are some legitimate things that this body must look at. I think that we have got to do this. I would hope that Senator Warner's committee looking at the needs and writing roles in regard to higher education will look very hard at just exactly what we have and what we need. So, I'm not speaking in favor of the Rasmussen amendment, I'm not speaking against it either, I'm saying that we have to look, we have to look at the long range future and a very legitimate thing is that we have far too many teachers and not enough, not enough jobs. That we have to have a comparison, a cost comparison. H-P-E-R at Peru does not graduate that many seniors in terms of, in that program, but it is necessary to have a building to have athletic programs and without athletic programs you don't have a college and those are legitimate needs also. I would hope that this body would be very mindful of the fact that we are going to have to face those tough decisions someday, maybe not now, maybe we
