

Language, because it all relates to whether it goes to the committee. The reason for wanting it to run through the committee is supposedly it is inappropriate and so on and so forth. The language which Senator Dworak brought up which you allowed him to discuss of malfeasance and misfeasance simply addresses the following problem. There is no person in this room or in state government who would claim that our property taxes or our property in this state is equalized in valuation. That means there is a problem. That problem could only occur as a result of somebody not doing something accidentally, misfeasance, or intentionally...

PRESIDENT: Senator, you are not on the subject.

SENATOR DeCAMP: I am on the precise subject you allowed Senator Dworak to talk about, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: But we have got to cut it off someplace, Senator. Why don't we discuss whether this is going to be referred to the Revenue Committee? We have already discussed whether this is an investigation committee or not.

SENATOR DeCAMP; The point I am, you know, it is remarkable, Mr. President, how other people get to discuss and old John doesn't. I am trying to argue why it should not go to the committee at this time until we resolve some other problems first, that that is even premature and I am saving the language just merely states that there is a problem which everybody acknowledges and that that is not offensive language. It is merely responsible language that addresses a problem and says it came from one of two things, people not doing their job intentionally or accidentally and that is not right and we have to correct it. The issue raised about whether such a thing had ever been done in the Legislature, let me take the pages of history back with you. 1972.

PRESIDENT: No, Senator.

SENATOR DeCAMP: Mr. President, this involved the entire resolution. There is precedent for exactly what we are doing without going through a committee and the precedent was an attempted bribe for which a man was convicted back in 1972 and Senator Warner sponsored the resolution and the resolution gave subpoena power to a specially created legislative committee that was directed to investigate that specific incident and that prior to the end of the session did reach conclusions based upon their subpoena power, special committee, the whole works. You know what I am talking about.

PRESIDENT: The appeal was dropped. What are you talking about?

SENATOR DeCAMP: I am showing why it should not go back to a committee.

PRESIDENT: I thought that was decided, that's why....

SENATOR DeCAMP: Jiminy Christmas, you are not in debate on this floor. You are the presiding officer (interruption).
