

grandfather clause. If it was a new junk and salvage yard, well of course they could have established it under special permits which would have requirements for setback and other necessary regulations for the operation of the yard and the protection of the area. Within my legislative district I have a sample of two where the area residents have a great deal of difficulty with yards that have been established under grandfather rights and no one has any authority other than the filing of a civil suit to help or force them to clean up. The kind of a problem is this yard where the cars are piled up right next to a farm drive and it becomes a collector of snow, people park in the farmer's drive and they have no particular way to control it. If you pass this bill it would give the county authority to set up some regulations for those few kinds of yards so that they could be required setbacks and control of weeds and other road problems, that type of thing and I would ask for the emergency clause to be attached so that use could be made of it in a couple instances in my district yet this year. I move adoption of the emergency clause.

PRESIDENT: The question is the adoption of this amendment, which is the emergency clause. Record your vote. Record.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays on the adoption of the Warner amendment, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: The amendment is adopted. Now the movement of the bill.

SENATOR WARNER: Mr. President, I move that the bill be advanced. I should point out one individual appeared in opposition. His operation was within the city limits and he was not affected and what is proposed here would not have been any different than what any other salvage yard is expected to comply with that is established through the normal zoning process, so I move the bill be advanced.

PRESIDENT: Discussion. The question then is the advancement of the bill. Record your vote. Record.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays on the advancement, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: The bill is advanced. The next bill we will consider is LB 286.

CLERK: Mr. President, (Read title to LB 286). The bill was read for the first time on January 19, 1977. It was referred to the Government, Military.....

PRESIDENT: Senator Stoney.

SENATOR STONEY: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, the Government, Military and Veterans Affairs Committee altered this bill by striking section three which had provided that each agency, commission or board appoint a committee. We felt that this might be unruly and in its stead replaced that section by indicating that those that would make that determination would be the Director of Personnel, Director of Administrative Services and the Auditor of Public Accounts.
