

Just kind of throw this out for some thought. Maybe we ought to just systematically adopt his amendments one after another so we can get it printed and find out what the bill is all about and then he can discuss and explain the whole thing because he is not asking to advance it. He just wants to get the bill in its form but he has to have eleven separate votes. Is that about right, Senator Burrows? Would that make sense to you if we did it that way? As I say you are not asking to move the bill you are just wanting to get it in its final form.

SENATOR BURROWS: Yes, I would like to get it in its form and then request permission of the body to get it printed into a white copy to adopt these amendments, incorporate them in the bill so people can look at it in the proper context.

SENATOR DE CAMP: It would sure seem to make sense to me that we would get them all adopted and get it done that way without debating the whole bill here today because otherwise we can be here eight months.

PRESIDENT: Well, Senator Burrows, the Chair is not being obstreperous here. We must vote these things individually. Your alternative would be to put several of these in one motion which is an option that you did not exercise.

SENATOR BURROWS: I did not challenge the Chair on it so I have moved the amendment.

PRESIDENT: Senator Fowler.

SENATOR FOWLER: I just say that I think Senator DeCamp has a good suggestion, that we ought to get these amendments adopted and let Senator Burrows print up a copy of the bill. We understand procedurally why this has to be done but probably just to expedite business we could adopt these without debate with the understanding that Senator Burrows will explain the whole bill after he gets it in the shape that it is in.

PRESIDENT: Senator Koch.

SENATOR KOCH: One question of Senator Burrows if he will yield.

SENATOR BURROWS: Yes.

SENATOR KOCH: Senator Burrows, you are familiar with a number of Attorney General's opinions that deal with the subject matter that you are trying to deal with, aren't you?

SENATOR BURROWS: Yes, and I think most of the objections, the Attorney General's opinion stated that the concept was in order and I think we take care of almost all the detailed objections he had.

SENATOR KOCH: I read about the Attorney General's opinion that is in the Journal that he directed to you relative to whether or not you can use this type of tax support schools. The point is it deals with LB 33 which is in a state of suspension. If I remember one Attorney General's opinion it specifically said the Legislature cannot deal with any substantive matter that might influence the vote on LB 33. Do you believe that this indeed would influence the right of the people as it relates to the referendum?

SENATOR BURROWS: LB 33 is an entirely different issue and different concept.
