SENATOR DE CAMP: Yes.

PRESIDENT: The question then is Senator DeCamp's amendment. Record your vote. Record.

CLERK: 34 ayes, 2 nays on the adoption of the DeCamp motion, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: The DeCamp motion is adopted. Are you extending your order, Mr. Speaker?

SPEAKER LUEDTKE: No, I think we ought to, if these special orders mean anything, we're going to have to stop at this point as far as I'm concerned.

PRESIDENT: All right. Okay. Senator DeCamp.

SENATOR DE CAMP: How many votes would it take to continue and resolve it?

PRESIDENT: Well, there isn't anything up before us. You had a special order.

SENATOR DE CAMP: Reluctantly, I accede to the Speaker's order.

PRESIDENT: We're still on motions. We're on LB 588. That's where we are.

CLERK: Mr. President,

PRESIDENT: Senator Marsh.

SENATOR MARSH: I move the Call be raised.

PRESIDENT: Record your vote on that issue. Have you all voted? Record.

CLERK: 19 ayes, 1 nay to raise the Call, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: The Call is raised. We go to motions, one hour only. LB 588. Senator Simon's attempt to raise that bill notwithstanding the action of the Committee. Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Simon moves to raise LB 588 from Committee notwithstanding the Committee's action. The motion can be found on page 663 of the Legislative Journal.

PRESIDENT: Senator Barnett, for what purpose do you arise?

SENATOR BARNETT: Mr. President, I would like to have the attention of the Judiciary Committee for just a second. I would like to meet back underneath the balcony and I appreciate your letting me make that announcement. The Judiciary Committee right back here underneath the balcony for a couple of minutes.

PRESIDENT: All right. That is on the north side, under the north balcony toward the rear of the Chamber. Now, Senator Neil Simon.

SENATOR SIMON: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, LB 588 is a bill which I introduced which called for setting up, establishing minimum insulation standards on new construction on homes. The bill was heard in Committee. There were about six people that supported the bill. There was no

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
