

better explanation of what your amendment is going to do before we ask for consideration. I'm interested to the extent of what is done with the identification cards themselves.

SENATOR DWORAK: Okay, Senator Duis. The bill went across initially, it read that the State Treasurer should be responsible for the issuance or the cost of the issuance of these cards when we should have kept it within the Department of Motor Vehicles. So the first portion of the amendment strikes "State Treasurer" and keeps it with the Department of Motor Vehicles. Number two, we had a problem with the effective date. We could not have had the mechanism--do you want to comment, Senator Duis?--we had a problem with the effective date and so we moved the effective date of the I.D.'s back to January 1st, 1979, and that eliminates the necessity for an emergency clause, otherwise we would have had to have an emergency clause. That's the two basic portions of the amendment. Number three, if there is a contractual alteration with Polaroid, it enables the State Department of Motor Vehicles to make those contractual alterations.

SENATOR DUIS: Well, I want to thank you Senator Dworak because I just had a call from the County Treasurer and apparently the wrong information went out on the reason for the returning of this piece of legislation. They apparently got the idea from someone I don't know if it's from the Governor's office or where it was, that this bill was returned to eliminate the identification cards entirely and I want you if you will, make this explanation because they did call me and they apparently got the wrong information from someone and I don't know who it was from.

SENATOR DWORAK: Thank you, Senator Duis, and I'll make that again very clear. This does not eliminate the identification card provision nor does it eliminate Senator Lamb's amendment, nor is it intended to. It merely puts in proper wording the implementation of these two amendments.

SENATOR DUIS: Well, I thank you because they were in hopes that it had eliminated the identification. Senator Maresh, did you have a remark that you could make to me?

SENATOR MARESH: Yes. When I first learned about this problem, the problem was in the I.D. cards but this has been worked out now so that's why the whole provision isn't stricken. It's just changes that Senator Dworak explained.

SENATOR DUIS: Thank you for the information because I was sure that they had received the wrong information.

SENATOR MARESH: At first it appeared that's the only way the Governor was going to sign it, but it has been worked out.

SENATOR DUIS: Thank you, very much.

SENATOR MILLS: Mr. President, I have a question of Senator Maresh.

SENATOR MARESH: Yes, Senator Mills.
