

SPEAKER LUEDTKE PRESIDING

SPEAKER LUEDTKE: The Legislature will reconvene. Register your presence please. While we are waiting for you to do so, the Chair would like to take this opportunity to introduce some 14 second second grade students from Prescott Elementary School, one teacher and five adults from Senator Fowler's and Senator Marsh's district. Would Carole Johnson who is the teacher stand up and be recognized for visiting their Legislature. Would you stand up, and welcome to your Legislature. Record the attendance please.

CLERK: Quorum present, Mr. President.

SPEAKER LUEDTKE: All right we will proceed then with agenda item Number 8, Resolutions. LR 174, Senator DeCamp's. Chair recognizes Senator DeCamp.

SENATOR DE CAMP: Mr. President, members of the Legislature. This is the Resolution that we explained the other day. Whether it would have a nickle's worth of effect, I don't know. The point is that it is one idea to drive up the price of grain, pull some of this grain off the market that doesn't cost anything, that doesn't involve any more bureaucracy or anything else. I think that Ross Rasmussen has talked to a lot of you and explained it. It would just be that some of these people that are investing in other tax free things could invest in some of this corn and grain and pull it off the market for a year or two and maybe this would help out. I urge you to adopt the Resolution. As I say, it is just a suggestion to send to the IRS and the Feds and see if they do anything about it.

SENATOR CULLAN: I Call for the question.
