SENATOR KOCH: Mr. Speaker, I never dignify remarks made out of stupidity. Senator Venditte ought to check the Blue Book and find out what my record is. Take that one, Mr. Venditte, and take it back to south rural Omaha. The point is that I know something about agriculture. That is where my roots have been. Many of my relatives still live in Campbell, Nebraska, Mr. Venditte, in case you don't know where it is get out your geography book, you seem to know a lot about everything else. This piece of Resolution does not attempt to solve any problems. We all know on this floor that those who farm have been misled over the years farm fence row to fence row, ditch to ditch. In case Senator Venditte doesn't know that, I planted trees once, for free, back in the dirty thirties to build shelter belts. They have torn them out. So, as a result you get an over supply of grain production because of technology, because of nitrates, because of a lot of abilities that we have never had before. The issue here, and Senator Kennedy said it well. Even though Senator DeCamp wasn't listening. It gives a certain few rich an advantage that they do not need. It will not help that person who has a surplus of grain. Senator Keyes said it well also. They are both very rural Senator Venditte, they know something about the issue. Just as I think I know a lot more about it than you do. I'm saying that if this body wants to come forward with viable alternatives to the Department of Agriculture, then we should do that. But for us to keep passing Resolutions to submit to Congress, particularly the IRS, this is really not worth our time, and already we have engaged ourselves in probably 25 minutes of futile debate on an issue that doesn't deserve our attention. I would submit to this body, this executive secretary that submitted this Resolution to Senator DeCamp for his submission to us would spend as much time with his business of helping the Nebraska State School Boards we would have a lot better progress with some other issues. I ask for you to indefinitely postpone the Resolution.
